We also need to look at other models throughout the U. S. to increase the use of other transportation funds but we need to be cost effective and not give contractors an open checkbook for projects never completed, such as the rail project on Oahu. The open checkbook cost of the new high school in Kihei is extremely overstated. The \$130 million dollar initial bid costs (not including potential overrides) will make it one of the most expensive schools in the nation at \$604 per square foot (New York is at \$204 per square foot the highest on the mainland) and that is too high for a community of 160,000 (Maui approximate population) or \$80,000 per student costs in Kihei.

7. Describe ways that you have supported safer walking and bicycling in your community. (short answer) *

By working with special education students for the past 20 years I am fully aware of the short comings dealing with accessability and biking has been overlooked in the same ways.

8. The State has the Bike Plan Hawaii (2003) and the Statewide Pedestrian Master Plan (2013) for bicycle and pedestrian improvements. What will you do when elected to implement these plan? (short answer) *

I will work to impliment the existing plans. I will also work to obtain funds from the overstated road funds to work to improve both roads and the building of bike and ADA accesses for the safety of our community, families and children.
