I support the updating of the Department of Transportation's Bike Plan Hawaii in order to integrate bikeway paths in our communities statewide. Having said that I feel the paths should be properly placed on roads where they do not interfere with cars traveling. In Mililani we do have designated bike paths, however, in some areas they appear to not be properly placed (near the center of the car lane vs. nearer,/more parallel to the sidewalk) and could possibly cause a safety concern for both bicyclists and motorists in vehicles.

4. Eighty-one percent of Hawaii commuters drive as their primary way of getting to work and 12% walk, bike, or take public transportation. I support the establishment of specific targets to reduce dependence on private automobile transportation and increase bicycling, walking and transit use, as Kauai County has done. *
